

H1 - Learn the Woodwind Instrument of Your Choice

H2 - An Overview of Woodwinds Instruments

Woodwinds instruments historically have been made of wood. Over the years, the manufacturing of these instruments has been updated. Now, woodwinds are made of wood, metal, plastic, or some combination of the three.

These instruments are made of tubes or cylinders, with holes in them. Each instrument has a mouthpiece at the top with an opening at the bottom.

Woodwind instruments are played by blowing into the mouthpiece (hence the 'wind' in the name) as you cover or uncover holes along the cylinder to change the notes.

Many of these instruments use reeds located in the mouthpieces to assist the playing. Reeds are thin pieces of wood that vibrate as you blow air over them. Some woodwinds' mouthpieces, like those in clarinets, are single reeds (made from one thin piece of wood) and others, like ones found in oboes and bassoons, use double reeds (two pieces of thin wood joined together).

Like stringed instruments, small woodwind instruments have higher pitches while larger instruments have lower ranges.

H2 - Types of Woodwind Instruments

There are several woodwind instruments and can be divided into six major categories:

H3 - Flutes and Piccolos – Flutes are the oldest of the woodwinds, and average slightly over two feet in length. Piccolos are shorter versions of flutes and play higher sounds.

H3- Clarinets – These instruments look very similar to an oboe but use a single reed in the mouthpiece instead of the oboe's double. Clarinets are made in several different sizes, though the most common is a little over two feet. Some musical compositions require one clarinet player to play different instruments in the same piece!

H3 - Saxophones – These are new to the family of woodwinds, having only been introduced around 150 years ago. A sax uses a single reed and is important in jazz and blues music, but is used in other styles, too. They come in a variety of different sizes and are played in the same fashion as clarinets.

H3 - English Horns – An English horn is not English and not a horn, making its name slightly confusing! English horns are closely related to the oboe and are played the same way. It has a wider tone and is longer, with a pitch range lower than an oboe.

H3 - Oboes – Orchestras usually have between two and four oboes. Oboes are about two feet in length and are black with metal keys to cover their holes. They offer a wide range of sounds, making their music easily memorable.

H3 - Bassoons – A bassoon has several keys and is very long, almost nine feet! To make the instrument easier to manage, the tube is doubled on itself so a player can hold it comfortably. Like an oboe, it is played while held upright as you blow through the double-reed in the mouthpiece.
